The test I like to employ when it comes to determining whether preattentive attributes are being used

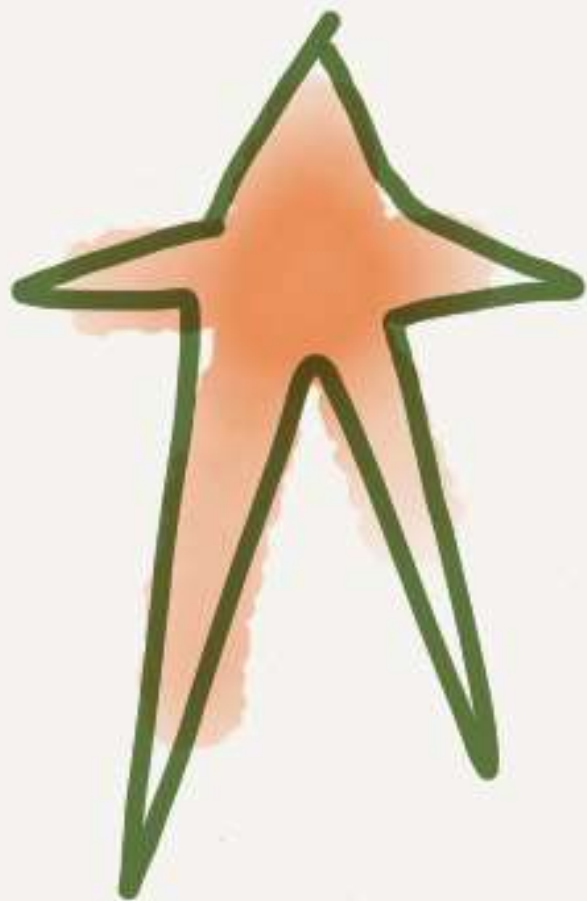

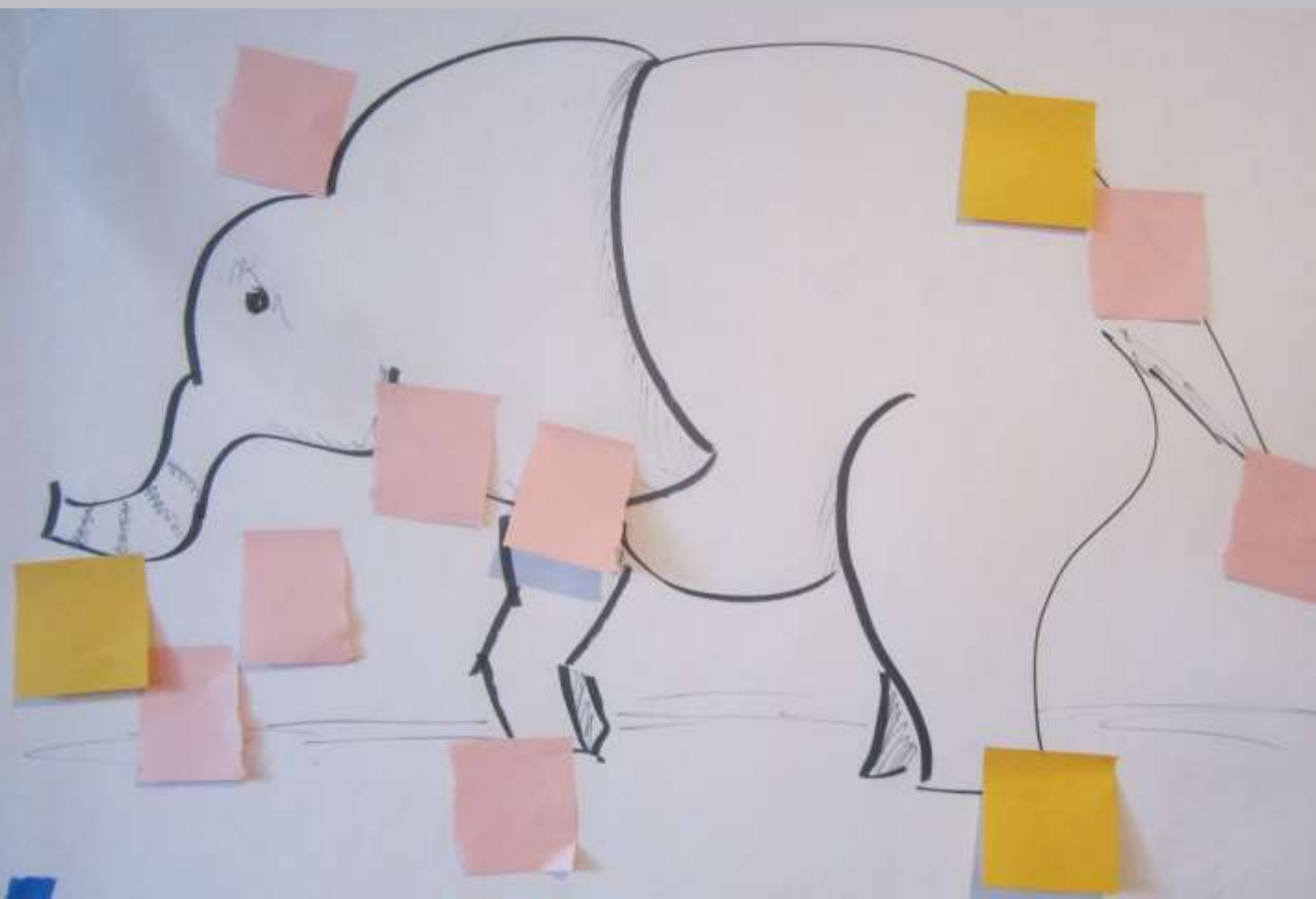


# Business Model - The Empathy Map
